Manager Provides Progress Update and Look to Future

## State of the Borough - Challenges Met, Solutions Found

Greetings, fellow residents! As we look forward to warmer temperatures of spring, I hope you and your family had an enjoyable, safe, and healthy Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year.

The following is a brief summary of projects and actions that have taken place since my last update in the August 2017 Miners' Journal. Additionally, I'm including a brief outline of exciting improvement projects planned for an active 2018.

#### Summer and fall 2017 updates

 Railroad crossing repairs – After years of back-and-forth over some concerns, I was able to

open a line of communication and build a cordial relationship with Reading Blue Mountain Northern Railroad. As a result, RBMN did a fantastic job repairing the street crossing and landscaping the area surrounding their tracks. The railroad also addressed a major safety concern by moving tankers located closely to the highway. It's smooth sailing over the tracks now, but hold down your speed. I hope to see the cordial relationship with RBMN to continue.

 Streets paving – As promised, a yearly paving program has been revived. Areas of Pine Hill, Heffner, Westwood, Pine, and Schuylkill streets were milled and paved during the summer. On a yearly basis, a priority list needing the most attention will be created and paving projects undertaken.

 Potholes – I know motorists have been upset these were not being addressed quickly enough. The Street Department has been filling potholes; but, our supplier wasn't able to provide material for several - Continued on Page 4

## **New Borough Officials**

Last November's municipal General Election elected two new members of Minersville Borough Council - Stephen Darosh and Robert Umbenhen - and new Minersville Mayor Leo Securda. They were sworn into office, effective January 1.

#### Councilor Stephen Darosh

Also known as "Beasly", Stephen Darosh has lived in Minersville most of his life. The youngest of five children of parents Veronica and Edward Darosh, he attended Saint Stanislaus parochial school through the 8th grade and then Minersville Area High School, graduating in 1983.

Steve joined the United States Marine Corps, completing boot camp at Paris Island in South Carolina. Duty stations included Fort Sill in Oklahoma for artillery training and then the desert of 29 Palms in California for two and a half years. He served a tour overseas - based in Okinawa, Japan - for one year that also included three months in Korea.

Steve then returned to Minersville where he now resides with his wife of 28 years, Melissa. The couple have two sons, Stephen Jr. and Jordan.

He worked at Cressona Aluminum for 19 years, Chester Salt for five years, and now works for Reading Anthracite Co. in Duncott. Community organizations are an important part of local life. months due to an equipment breakdown and then priority was given to large PennDOT projects. We were able to obtain material the third week of September.

Another supplier was identified; but, because of the distance, the material would have solidified by its arrival time in Minersville. Potholes were addressed with hot asphalt until the plant closed for the season in November. Until the opening of the materials sup-

plier in spring, cold patch will be used to address substantially-sized potholes. On the cost side, cold patch is more expensive than hot asphalt and is only a temporary fix.

• Street crack sealing was completed on prioritized streets. Crack sealing is done to extend the life of the streets. Sealing was done throughout the fall.

• Blighted property help – As one of the pioneers creating the first Schuylkill County Land Bank, Minersville was the first

to be granted funds for the rehab of the blighted property at 228 Lewis Street. The building was totally rehabbed inside and out with new appliances installed. This formerly abandoned property was sold by the Land Bank and is now back on the tax rolls.

• Municipal parking lot repaving – During a storm water project on South Street, Council authorized the repaving of the municipal lot on Sunbury Street.

In addition, the Street Department has completed relocation to our Penn Street building. Residents are reminded that all contact with the Street Department must go through the Borough Office. The Penn Street location is for employees only and not open to the public.

two projects – \$308,270 for Pedestrian Improvements and Over Speed Warning System and \$181,920 for Traffic Signal Coordination, both to improve safety and traffic control on Rt. 901.

The projects will begin later this spring or summer. Included will be traffic signal retiming and coordination, pedestrian improvements, and installation of over speed warning systems at the eight intersections along the Sunbury Street corridor. The grants require the work to be completed by June 2019.

• Planning for the future – Pennsylvania's Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) has provided funds through its Early Intervention Program for Minersville to retain Fairmount Capital Advisors to do an assessment of the borough's financial condition, provide a management audit, assess current and forecast future financial trends, and to present a recommendation on a five-year budget plan.

The preliminary results/recommendations of the firm's analysis were presented at an advertised public meeting attended by 15 to 20 town officials and residents. Fairmount solicited public input and feedback. A final report is pending and will be presented to Council for their review.

• Community park creation – With Keystone Communities grant funding, the Borough retained the services of Derck and Edson for the planning and development of a community park on the for-

mer Legion property. Groundbreaking for the park is hoped as early as this spring or summer.

• Blighted properties a priority – The Borough continues to work through the Schuylkill County Land Bank to address blighted properties. Properties at 140-142-144 Sunbury Street have been acquired for \$100 with grant funding approval for demolition, put up for sale, and hopefully returned to the tax rolls. Expect this aggressive stance addressing blighted properties to continue.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve all of you and provide you with this update on the State of the Borough.



## Public Meetings . . . Be Part of What's Happening!

Minersville Borough governance is an open book. All agencies and boards meet in public, discuss the needs and challenges of the Borough, and make decisions how best to serve residents, businesses, and property owners.

Following are the published dates for Minersville Borough Council, Minersville Municipal Authority, Minersville Sewer Authority, and the Minersville Planning Commission.

Open to the public, all meetings are held in the Council Chambers building located at the corner of North Delaware Ave. and East Carbon St. beginning at 7 p.m. Time is allotted for any Borough resident to speak on matters before each body.

#### Borough Council

Minersville Borough Council meets two times each month.

A "Work Session" meeting is held the first Tuesday of each month during which agenda items are discussed. Motions and votes may be taken if time-critical action is necessary. Typically however, agenda items are scheduled for action at the regular monthly Council meeting held a week later on the second Tuesday of each month.

In 2018 Work Session meetings will be held Feb. 6, March 6, April 3, May 1, June 5, July 3, Aug. 7, Sept. 4, Oct. 2, and Nov. 7 (Wednesday). There is no scheduled

Work Session in December.

Regular monthly Council meetings in 2018 will be held Feb. 13, March 13, April 10, May 8, June 12, July 10, Aug. 14, Sept. 11, Oct. 9, Nov. 13, and Dec. 11.

#### Municipal Water Authority Board

Meetings of the Municipal Water Authority Board are held the third Monday of each month.

In 2018, the Municipal Water Authority Board will meet Feb. 20 (Tuesday), March 19, April 16, May 21, June 18, July 16, Aug. 20, Sept. 17, Oct. 15, Nov. 19, and Dec. 17. An exception to the rule, the February meeting is the third Tuesday this year.

#### Sewer Authority Board

The Minersville Sewer Authority Board meets the fourth Wednesday of each month.

Meetings for 2018 will be held Feb. 28, March 28, April 25 (at the sewer plant), May 23, June 27, July 25, Aug. 22, Sept. 26, Oct. 24, Nov. 28, and Dec. 19. Due to the Christmas holiday, the December meeting will be held on the third Wednesday this year.

#### Planning Commission

Meetings of the Minersville Planning Commission are scheduled quarterly. Remaining in 2018 are meetings on April 4, July 11, and Oct. 3.



#### Guard against frozen pipes this winter


The Minersville Water Authority offers the following tips to "weather" through this winter season.

When there are extreme frost conditions, the risk of frozen water lines is real. If your home has had issues in the past, make sure you are running your water and also contact the Water Authority office to let us know.

Residents are asked to monitor the temperature of their water. If your water temperature reaches below 40 degrees F or lower, you should IMMEDIATELY start running a continuous pencil-size stream of cold water from one faucet. Monitoring temperatures is your first line of defense.

If you see or hear water running from a neighboring property (especially vacant properties) notify the Water Authority IMMEDIATELY.

If you think you have frozen water lines, here are some steps to find the problem and get you back into service.

Identify whether the problem exists throughout the whole house or in one area. Open the cabinets beneath any

place with a water supply, such as the kitchen and bathroom sinks, to allow warm air to circulate. If there are small children in the home, remove any toxic substances first.

Open the cold water faucet nearest the frozen pipe to relieve the pressure of expanding ice, which may lead to a burst pipe. If your water lines do freeze, never try to thaw a line with an open flame or torch. You can use a hair dryer or portable heater, but always be careful of the potential for electric shock in and around standing water.

If you think you may have a frozen water meter, contact the Minersville Water Authority at 570-544-

2200. For after-hours emergencies, call 570-527-6165. Be advised, after-hours charges will apply.

#### Ash collection

Ashes are collected Tuesdays and Fridays throughout the Borough during January and February. All other months, collection will be once per week on Tuesdays only.




high school auditorium. Tickets for the show are \$10 for adults and \$8 for students and senior citizens.

#### Cold weather safety

PPL Electric Utilities offers the following public advisory regarding the use of space heaters and portable generators.

After hurricanes several years ago, many homeowners invested in portable generators. They come in handy, but they have to be used safely for both the occupants of the home and for PPL Electric Utilities line workers. Here's why:

Generators need to be operated away from homes and away from spaces where deadly carbon monoxide fumes can enter your residence. Never operate your generator in a garage or other enclosed space.



For PPL worker safety, be sure you operate your generator in a way that prevents electricity produced by the generator from going back into the power

line that feeds your home. This is called "back feed" and occurs when an improperly connected generator begins feeding electricity "back" through the power lines. This can seriously injure anyone near lines,

especially crews working to restore power.

Have a qualified electrician install a transfer switch. The transfer switch breaks the path of electricity between the power lines and your main electrical panel. This is the best way to protect you, your

neighbors and repair crews from back feed.

Space heaters can help take the chill off, but be sure to use them the right way to help prevent the risk of fire or electrical shock.

The Electrical Safety Foundation International advises you to plug your space heater directly into a wall outlet and not use an extension cord or power strip that could overheat and result in a fire. Do not plug any other electrical devices into the same outlet as the heater. Of course, you should also remember to place the heater on a level flat service and at least three feet away from furniture or curtains or anything else that can burn.

As winter will eventually subside and residents will take advantage of the walking path and other areas of the recreation complex, pets are prohib-



ited and tobacco use is also prohibited under ordinance. Set a good example for our youth. Remind others and avoid violation of these ordinances. Violators are subject to fines.

empty containers no later than 24 hours after pickup. Violators are subject to up to a \$300 fine. Police will also be increasing enforcement of this ordinance.

This contact information will only be used in the event of such an emergency.



## Minersville Little League Softball ... by Jerry Sitkus

## Fantastic Beginnings to a Softball Dynasty

This is Part 1 in a series to be continued in future issues of Miners' Journal.

Most sports fans are familiar with the success of the Minersville High School girls' softball team – the Big Blue Machine. Since 1974, the first year for the program, the Miners have won numerous division, league, district titles, and an unprecedented 10 State Championships!

Something people tend to forget, or simply don't know, is that the Minersville Little League Softball All-Star teams have won a total of 15 State Championships since 1974! They have also played in thirteen Eastern Regional tournaments and four World Series! The 11-to-12 year old team finished third in the World Series in 1983, while the 13-to-15 year old team finished third in 1976 and then in second place in 1978 and 1985.

This year is the 45th season for Little League Girls' Softball in Minersville. In 1974 there was an increasing number of girls showing interest in playing baseball, so the Minersville Little League decided to form the 9-to-12 year old softball program.

It took a few good people to get the ball rolling. Billy Charles, Mrs. Pat Ralston and Bill Wenner canvassed the town to get sponsors for the teams. More than enough girls came to try out. There were enough girls to fill four teams with 15 players on each team.

Some girls had to wait until the following year to be on a team.

At the time, girls softball was not very popular, so the first year the teams did not have a sponsor. The names of the teams were named after some Major League baseball teams, the Phillies, A's, Reds and Pirates. The players did not have uniforms; they wore t-shirts and jeans. The same outfit was worn for the All-Star games.

First year coaches were Billy Charles, Ann Marie Whiteash, Joanne Sanza, Karen Ostrowski, Mary Ann Cremo, Andrea Ruscavage, Adrienne Walasavage, Joan Connelly, Marion Maddis, Pat Ralston, Germaine Newton and Gene Brentari.

The first game was played on Memorial Day on the Little League field, with the Reds beating the Pirates 12-0. The rest of the season's games were played at the High School field in the outfield area. The infield was just grass – with lumps and stones – so not an easy play on ground balls.

The teams also played on the teener field in the outfield areas above the Little League field ... same infield conditions as the high school field plus there was no backstop, just the hill bank. There wasn't a press box or public address system. The players and fans had to walk to the Little League field for the restroom and concession stand.


Bats in the early days were wooden since aluminum bats were not in wide use. The rules were a little different than the boys' rules. The girls were not allowed to steal; bunting or chop hits were prohibited; and any player that slides would be called out.

This first year the league fielded an 11-12 year old All-Star team. At the time, ten players took the field instead of nine. The "short fielder" as it was called, was placed in the outfield and usually would take away a number of would-be clean hits.

The team was known as the Minerettes. Initial team members were Beth Lechleitner, Cheryl Shulkusky, Patty Sorokach, Ruth Ann Graeff, Bonnie Wenner, Linda Ralston, Krista Borell, Rose Fesnock, Lori Trezise, Carolyn Harley, Lori Sninski, Linda Pizzico, Valerie Land and Cindy Connelly. Coaches were AnnMarie Whiteash, Joan Connelly, and Billy Charles.

Being the only team in District 24, the Minerettes got a free trip to the first state tournament for girls. Six teams were in the three-day tournament held in Downingtown, with the winner advancing to the East

Region tournament in Providence, Rhode Island. The team went into the tourney thoroughly untested.

The Minerettes showed none of that inexperience, however, by defeating Darby, 6-0. They beat Spring City in the next game in ten innings by a score of 6-5 to put themselves in the final. The locals then beat West Pittston 6-0 to capture the first state Little League softball championship.

It was an exciting time in Minersville that year. The boys' 11-12 year old All-Stars, which in 1973 became the first team from Minersville to reach the state baseball tournament, were back in the state tournament in 1974. The boys and girls played for the title on the same day. The boys earned a second place finish while the girls captured the very first Little League softball State Championship.

Next was the Eastern Regional Tournament in Providence, Rhode

Island. The Minerettes won the first game against Durham, Connecticut by a score of 8-1. Dix Hills, N.Y. was next, playing for the title and a trip to the World

Series in Freeport, N.Y. The Minerettes lost a tough extra inning game 1-0, settling for second best in the East. Die-hards who thought Little League

is for boys only and that girls should stick to playing "house" had to face the fact girls' Little League softball was here to stay.

Winning the State Championship in the first year brought even more girls interested to play softball. In 1975 the Minersville Little League Board of Directors decided to organize the 13-15 year old Senior division softball teams. Little did they know the impact this decision would have on the future of many young girls, their parents, and citizens throughout the community. It was much easier to get sponsors for the teams in 1975 after the success of that first year. The Junior teams (9-12yr) had sponsors: Quandel Construction, New Minersville Hose Co., Independent Hose Co., and Walacavage.

The Senior League had four teams: Center Supply, Rescue Hose Co., Pritz Dodge, and Cremo's. The coaches were Frank Rizzardi, Aldona and Don Butler, Ernie Pizzico, Cindy Borrell, Billy Charles, Maxine Sorokach, Bill and Dolores Wenner, Ann Marie and Rocky O'Boyle.

The majority of players from the 1974 Junior teams moved up to the Senior division in 1975. The All-Star team consisted of most of the same players from the year before. The team now had experience and were ready to make another run at winning a State Championship.

The Miners played Devon-Strafford in the Section

4 game and won, 14-2, to advance to the State tourney. The Miners then beat Darby, 9-5, and West Pittston twice, 7-6 and 17-10, to capture the girls' historic first 13-to-15 year old State title.

There was no further competition for the Senior Division in 1975. The Junior Division team, although consisting of mostly all new players, won the Section 4 title by winning three games – beating Hellertown, 23-0, Darby, 26-1, and Downingtown, 8-0. The Minerettes then moved on to the State tournament, beating Shippensburg, 7-3, and then defeating West Pittston (the team they beat last year for the title) by a 16-5 margin to repeat as State Champs.

The Minerettes lost to New Castle, Delaware, 4-2, in the first round of the single-elimination Eastern Regional tournament played in Narragansett, R.I. They defeated Rumford, R.I. in the consolation game to place third in the East.

It was a banner year again for the Minersville Little League girls in 1975 as they brought home two State Championship titles. This certainly was the beginning of people saying the local girls have put Minersville "on the map."
