Memorial Day Weekend Opening Possible; Swim Season Starts June 3

Everyone in the Pool! Spring/Summer Events in High Gear

Act fast! Admission cost at the Minersville Community Pool, located at the Fourth Street Recreation Complex, is increasing, but not for loyal customers!

The pool will open on a daily basis beginning Sat., June 3 from noon to 7 p.m. If the weather cooperates and maintenance needs have been completed, the pool may be open for the Memorial Day weekend (May 27-28-29) each day at noon. Check the borough website or call the borough office near the end of the month for final details.

Starting June 3, season admission will increase \$5 for all Minersville resident passes and \$10 for all non-resident passes. But, if current pass holders wish to renew their season passes, they can do so by June 2 at their current rate.

holders renew their passes between December 15 and April 1 they can maintain their previous year's rate. This will allow loyal customers who regularly visit and purchase season passes to avoid increases. So buy now and avoid rising costs. Any break in pass purchases will void the Loyalty Rate.

Applications can be made at the Borough Office, 2 E. Sunbury St., or by downloading on-line at:

www.minersvilleonline.com

and mailing to the borough office. During the swim season, passes can also be purchased at the pool. All applications will be verified before passes are issued. Fraudulent information voids passes.

Loyalty Rates for a season of swimming

"Loyalty Rate" season passes for Borough residents will be: \$50 for a Student, \$60 for an Adult, \$40 for Senior Citizens; \$95 for a Family up to five plus \$20 for each additional.

Non-resident "Loyalty Rate" season passes will be: \$60 for a Student, \$75 for an Adult, \$55 for Senior Citizens; \$120 for a Family up to five plus \$30 for each additional.

New regular rate season costs

The increased season pass costs for Minersville Borough residents, if you don't qualify for the Loyalty Rate, is \$55 for a Student, \$65 for an Adult, \$45 for a - Continued on Page 4

Senior Citizen, and \$100 for a Family up to five plus \$20 for each additional.

Non-resident regular rate season passes will be: \$70 for a Student, \$85 for an Adult, \$65 for a Senior Citizen, and \$130 for a Family up to five plus \$30 for each additional.

A "Family" consists of parents or a couple and up to three children, all permanent residents of the same household and same immediate family ... or one adult and up to four children. A separate pass is required for any adult, 18 or older, residing in the household (adult children, grandparents, aunts, uncles).

Daily admission prices for this year remain the same at: \$2 for a Pre-School child and Senior Citizens, \$3 for Student (age four through 17), \$5 for Adult (age 18 and over); Evening admission from 5 to 7 p.m. will be 50% off the daily rate.

Pre-School is a child, age three or younger. Senior Citizens must be age 55 or older.

Children under age 10 must be accompanied by a responsible adult 18 years of age or older. Without a responsible adult, children under 10 will be denied admission to the pool. There is no non-swimmer discount; all patrons entering the pool are required to pay the appropriate fee. A policy regarding lawn chair use in the pool is being discussed.

Pool pavilion available to rent

The swimming pool pavilion is an ideal place to hold your summer birthday party. Two party-size rental options are available, each with a damage/cleaning fee of \$50 in addition to the rental cost. Full payment is required two weeks in advance.

Option 1 is for a group of up to 20 guests with a maximum of 15 children for a set cost of \$150. Additional guests in excess of 20 cost \$10 each.

Option 2 covers 35 to 50 guests with a maximum of 40 children for \$300. Attendees in excess of 50 will cost \$10 additional.

Two time slots per day are available ... 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 5 to 8 p.m. Pool admission for all guests is included along with food and drink menu options.

Closing Policy

The pool may close or be closed early in the case of inclement weather or low attendance. The Minersville Community Swimming Pool will require immediate closure of the pool in the event that lightning or thunder is present in or around the area and the pool will remain closed until 30 minutes past the last visible lightning strike or episode of thunder.

The pool will be closed if air temperature is 60 degrees or below.



From the Desk of the Borough Manager

Spring has sprung and summer is just around the corner. Exciting projects and events are in the works.

I'm happy to report the award of a \$50,000 Early Intervention Program Grant. This will allow the Borough to hire an independent consultant to develop a 3-to-5-year Financial Plan and Management Review. Such a plan is necessary to avoid the fate of so many

other municipalities declaring Act 47 – severe financial difficulty – that threatens the health, welfare, and safety of their residents. RFPs – Requests For Proposals – with a deadline of May 15 have gone out to six professional firms. The grant will fund \$35,000; we'll need to provide \$15,000 locally.

Not successful was our grant request for Park Rehabilitation and Development through the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR)

to fund repairs and improvements to our playgrounds. The Borough will pursue other grant sources to keep this need on track.

We are awaiting response for the following grants that have yet to be awarded:

 Automated Red Light Enforcement – The intent of this program is to fund worthwhile, relatively low-cost projects that improve the safety and mobility of the traveling public. The kinds of eligible projects vary widely, including improvements to traffic signals, roadway improvements at signalized intersections, school zones, guiderail, and roadside safety.

- Green Light Go Traffic signal modernization and improvement for critical corridors designed to improve safety and mobility by reducing congestion and improving efficiency on key state highways.
- DCED Keystone Communities Grant

 Demolition of the Legion building and construction of a Memorial Park.

Schuylkill County has been awarded grant funds to assist communities needing demolition of blighted properties. Minersville was awarded the first project – the demolition of the

was awarded the first project – the demolition of the former Legion Post 544 building expected to begin in early May. The grant requires no match of funds from the Borough.

We will seek additional funding from the county to target other Borough properties that threaten the health, safety, welfare, and property values. The properties being pursued also have liens on them for taxes, code violations, etc.

Snowstorm strategy paid off

Early planning and execution minimized the impact of this year's largest snowstorm on March 14. News and weather outlet forecasting varied widely from "some accumulation" to a full blown storm with a heavy snowfall expected.

With that uncertainty, councilman and street chairman Paul Vuksta and I decided to plan for the worst and hope for the best. Meeting with the street personnel, we outlined a plan of attack. Contractors were called and asked to be on standby for storm cleanup.

Mayor Post declared a snow emergency and local print, radio, and television media sent out the alert

to our residents. Our office staff posted the declaration on our website and Facebook page. That declaration bans parking on the snow emergency routes of Sunbury, Front, and South 3rd streets. The odd-numbered side of North Street was also included in the parking ban to allow a traffic detour from Sunbury Street during the snow cleanup.

The winter storm walloped the Borough and Schuylkill County with the most snowfall the state has seen in March since 1993. All of the pre-planning worked, providing at least one passable lane for emergency vehicles and necessary traffic during and after the storm.

Within two days after the storm, all snow was removed from the driving and parking areas on the snow emergency routes and on North Street. A tremendous team effort by the street, sewer, water, office, police department, contractors, councilman Vuksta, and myself, – and maybe most importantly, our residents! – got the Borough up and running again quickly.

Cooperation with Pottsville

The City of Pottsville recently passed an ordinance that takes a tougher stance on code violations as well as landlords who are delinquent on taxes, water and sewer bills. Minersville has an ordinance that addresses this situation, but Pottsville's has more bite to it.

reviewing Pottsville's ordinance for a possible revision or replacement to our own.

Children's safety program

At the request of the Borough, members of the Pennsylvania State Police, Goodwill Ambulance and Minersville EMS presented a program on children's safety to young students at St. Nicholas and Minersville Area Elementary schools.

This need was in response to social media alerts that used syringes, whether these be diabetic or drug needles, have been found in areas of the Borough. With warm weather and the coming end of the school year, families and young children will be out and

about. The educational program was valuable at this time.

Other items of interest

Necessary repairs to the pool – caulking, crack repair, and painting – will be completed by opening day.

Work progresss at the Street Department building on Penn Street. Renovations to an office area have been completed. Construction of a truck ramp will cost \$13,500 and furnishings for the office will be procured from government surplus. The building is anticipated to be occupied by the middle of May.

The Schuylkill County Land Bank's first project at 228 Lewis St. is undergoing renovations. The property will be put up for sale and put back on the tax rolls. Other blighted properties are being eyed for the same process.

Enjoy the Recreation Complex

Every day Minersville's Recreation/Swimming Pool complex is enjoyed by town residents and visitors from surrounding communities. The Borough expends resources to provide a safe and secure environment. People are encouraged to



use the complex, but adults must be responsible for the conduct of their children.

If you send your children to the playground while visiting the complex, one adult from each team or group must also be present to monitor the playground's use. Teams using the fields must finish play no later than 10 p.m.

The Minersville Police Department reminds all that the complex is closed from dusk to dawn unless an activity has been approved by Minersville Borough Council. Dogs (yes, even small dogs) are not allowed on the ball fields or anywhere in the complex. Smoking is not allowed. Fines for violations may be imposed and any illegal activity is subject to arrest.

Please help your neighborhood


Blocked street drains can create a hazard for you and your neighbors. If you see the drain near your house is clogged with litter, please take a few minutes to open it with a broom or shovel.

Public meetings

Minersville Borough Council meets for a work session the first Tuesday of each month and its monthly business meeting the second Tuesday of each month. The public is welcome to attend these meetings held in the Water Authority building located on N. Delaware Ave. beginning at 7 p.m.

Compost site

The Borough compost site is located at the north-



ern end of N. Delaware Avenue and is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Saturday from 8 a.m. to noon.

The site accepts grass clippings, leaves, tree trimmings, and other reasonable yard waste. Items collected in plastic bags should be emptied from the bag before being deposited at the compost site. Take your bags with you.

Your responsibilities

Borough Ordinance 183 requires dog owners to keep their dog confined to their own property. When taking the dog for a walk, the animal must be on a leash. The ordinance also requires the person walking the dog to clean up any fecal matter discharged by the dog. Fecal matter deposited by the animal on the After Your Pet owner's property must be picked up

within twenty-four hours to prevent becoming a danger to public health. All dogs are required to be licensed and vaccinated. Dogs are prohibited in the Recreation Complex on South 4th Street.

High grass and weeds

Borough Ordinance 291 requires grass and weeds not exceed eight inches in height. Not only is it unsightly, the wild growth can become home to rodents, snakes and other creatures we don't want in

our yards or near our homes. Be a good neighbor and keep your grass cut and your property free of junk and debris. Violators are subject to a \$300 fine or risk a lien placed on the property if the Borough has to cut the grass in the interest of public safety.

Smile! You're on video

A video surveillance system is in operation at the compost site. The system monitors illegal dumping from any vehicle entering and leaving. Only recyclable materials and grass and brush clippings are permitted. Fines for violators could run into thousands of dollars.

Help beautify Minersville

Borough Police and Code Enforcement officers are cracking down on individuals who leave their property in a state of disrepair. A well-maintained property enhances the beauty of the Borough and increases property value for all homeowners.

Landlords must register

The Residential Rental Ordinance requires landlords to register their properties with the Borough. It also regulates inspection of the unit, which is conducted every three years, and inspection of all rental units prior to any change of occupancy.

The ordinance also contains regulations for Occupant Permits for all tenants. This is a one-time fee for each occupant in a rental property as long as the tenant resides in the same unit. Failure for either the landlord or occupants to abide by this ordinance will result in citations issued by the Borough.

Bill payments

Minersville Borough, Water, and Sewer departments have added two other options for bill payment – online payment and direct withdrawal.

Please understand, these are optional ways to pay. You may continue to pay by cash, check or money order payments at our office Monday through Thursday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Friday 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.; or mail payments to our office at 2 E. Sunbury Street, Minersville.



ment. To make the payments online you will need the account and pin number.

If you have multiple accounts you will have a separate pin number for each account. Should you lose your pin number, contact the Borough office to send a letter to your billing address with the pin number. Pin numbers will not be given out over the phone.

Direct withdrawal payments will be taken from the bank account on the billing due date. Questions regarding the new payment options? Contact the Borough office at 570-544-2149.

Replacing your windows?

If you are contemplating replacing windows, be



aware before purchasing that all windows installed in this area must have a U-factor of 0.35 or lower. This number has been established under the Uniform Construction Code and adopted by the State of Pennsylvania and enforced throughout. If the windows do not have the proper U-factor, they will not pass code inspection.

Recycle those electronics

The state Covered Device Recycling Act prohibits

the disposal of desktop computers, laptop computers, computer monitors, computer peripherals and televisions. If these items are placed on the curb for pickup, the trash hauler will not take them.

Electronics recycling is held periodically by the Schuylkill County Office of Solid Waste in coordination with Minersville Borough. Residents should store their discarded electronics until the next collection.

Fall Cleanup accepts large and small

Minersville Borough partners with the Schuylkill County Office of Solid Waste by hosting a collection site for large items during the annual Fall Cleanup & Recycling Event, usually held in September.

Until then, residents and property owners are asked to store scrap tires, scrap metal, appliances, electronics, and any other bulky items until the fall cleanup for proper disposal. Specific dates and times of collection will be published in local newspapers and on the county government website.

Household hazardous waste (paint, solvents, cleaners, poisons) is not accepted at any of the general cleanup events because they may require special handling and disposal. Reminders from Code Enforcement

When planning your summer projects, remember to contact the Borough Office regarding building permits.

Permits are required for all new construction and all replacement or alterations of roofs, windows, doors, garage doors, electrical, plumbing, heating systems (including supplemental heating units), sidewalks, curbing, fencing with 6-foot maximum height, chimney replacement, or installation of liners, foundations, swimming pool and hot tub installation, oil storage tanks, sub-flooring, and interior renovations.

Adding to your existing structure, i.e. new decks, enclosing decks, will require a building permit and a zoning permit. Zoning permits are administered by the Schuylkill County Zoning Office, 570-628-1415.

Also, if you are replacing windows, all windows installed in this area must have a U-factor of .35. This number has been established under the 2009 Uniform Construction Code, adopted by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and enforced throughout the state. If the windows do not have the proper U-factor, they will not pass code inspection.

Code compliance

Ordinance No. 299, Alternate Dispute Resolution, exists to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Borough. This ordinance provides for the issuance of tickets, citations and penalties to owners and/or occupiers of properties, assuring for code compliance and maintenance of properties in a timely manner, for quality-of-life violations.

Violations can occur in the following areas:

- Accumulation of rubbish, garbage, junk or litter.
- Storing of hazardous material.
- Storing of recyclables.
- Storage containers for waste or trash must be durable, watertight, made of metal or plastic

Prevent animal access

Due to an increased number of calls to our office this year regarding issues with wild animals (i.e. feral cats, skunks, raccoons, etc), follow these tips to address the issues within our Borough.

Deny animal access to your trash. Get a trash can that has locks on it or is very difficult to open. Lock your trash cans in a shed or your garage and prevent entry. Only take the garbage cans out the evening before collection.

Keep food out of your yard.

Do not feed your dogs or cats outside and do not leave your left over food from meals outside. If you have a fruit tree, clean up the felled apples, peaches, etc. on a regular basis. If you have an outside garden, construct a good fence around it.

Skunks are horrible climbers and even worse at jumping. A barrier just might do the trick, but they are excellent diggers. Keep them out with wire mesh barriers three feet high and buried one foot deep. Seal up any holes and ditches. Close off openings under your home, sheds and decks.

Never Forget.

Forever Honor

For nearly 150 years, Americans have gathered in late spring to honor the sacrifice of those who have given their lives in service to their country. What began with dozens of informal commemorations of those killed in the Civil War has grown to become one of the nation's most solemn and hallowed holi-

days. From its earliest incarnation as "Decoration Day" to its modern-day observances, here are some surprising facts about the history of Memorial Day.

In May 1868, General John A. Logan, the commander-in-chief of the Union veterans' group known as the Grand Army of the Republic, issued a decree that May 30 should become a nationwide day of commemoration for the more than 620,000 soldiers killed in the recently ended Civil

On Decoration Day, as Logan dubbed it, Americans should lay flowers and decorate the graves of the war dead "whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land." According to legend, Logan chose May 30 because it was a rare day that didn't fall on the anniversary of a Civil War battle, though some historians believe the date was selected to ensure that flowers across the country would be in full bloom.

Although the term Memorial Day was used beginning in the 1880s, the holiday was officially known as Decoration Day for more than a century, when it was changed by federal law.


Four years later, the Uniform Monday Holiday Act of 1968 finally went into effect, moving Memorial


Day from its traditional observance on May 30 (regardless of the day of the week), to a set day - the last

Monday in May.

For almost as long as there's been a holiday, there's been a rivalry about who celebrated it first. Boalsburg, Pa., bases its claim on an 1864 gathering of women to mourn those recently killed at Gettysburg. In Carbondale, Illinois, they're certain that they were first, thanks to an 1866 parade led, in part, by John Logan who two years later would lead the charge for an official holiday. There are even two dueling Columbus challengers (one in Mississippi, the other in Georgia) who have battled it out for Memorial Day supremacy for decades.

Despite the increasing celebration of the holiday as a summer rite of passage, there are some formal rituals still on the books. The American flag should be hung at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day, then raised to the top of the staff. And since 2000, when

the U.S. Congress passed legislation, all Americans are encouraged to pause for a National Moment of Remembrance at 3 p.m. local time.
