Only Minersville Police Officer to Die in Line of Duty

Milan Barber to be Enshrined in Police Hall of Fame

Milan (Millie) Barber was born in Steelton, Pennsylvania in 1920 ... the son of Serbian immigrants who came through Ellis Island in 1910. He was one of seven children and worked as a laborer in a steel mill following his high school graduation.

He enlisted in the U.S. Navy the day after the Pearl Harbor invasion and was assigned to the naval destroyer U.S.S. Henry A. Wiley. He was a machinist's mate working in the engine room below water level.

The Henry Wiley earned the nickname "Hammering Hank" for its contributions to the South Pacific campaign. It was part of the largest amphibious operation of the Pacific War, sweeping mines to clear the channels for the attack on Okinawa.

The destroyer also served a critical support role in the Battle of Iwo Jima. "Hammering Hank" pounded the famous stronghold, Mount Suribachi, with 3600 rounds before the U.S. Marine capture and planting of the flag at the top of Mount Suribachi. After the war, Milan spent some time as an instructor of engine room mechanics at the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland.

It was during his time serving in the U.S. Navy that he met Madeline Parulis, born and raised in Minersville, at a USO dance. She had been visiting with

her sister in Harrisburg when fate united them.

They married and chose Minersville as their permanent residence to raise their family. After working various jobs in the manufacturing sector, Milan was offered a job as a security guard in a local production facility. That led to an offer to become a parttime police officer in Minersville. Eventually, an offer of a full-time position came along and Milan enthusiastically accepted.

Millie loved being a police officer and he loved Minersville. He, as well as the other police officers, were known by most of the town as they would walk the beat and engage the public on a daily basis.

The fatal night in 1970

While working the night shift on June 19 of 1970, Officer Barber and his partner, Officer William Charles, were observing from the lot (now the Dollar General) a perpetrator trying to steal a car at the Rothermel Dairy (now the site of Fuel-On Mini Market).

As they attempted to apprehend the suspect, a struggle ensued. While Officer Charles returned to the car to retrieve additional necessary equipment, Officer Barber was overpowered by the younger suspect and suffered a heart attack. Returning to the scene, Charles immediately rushed Barber to the hospital.

Although the suspect initially escaped, he was later apprehended and charged with larceny, resist-

ing arrest and manslaughter. He accepted a plea deal to drop the manslaughter charge and was sentenced to two years in prison. He escaped from the county prison after serving only a few months, but was recaptured.

Officer Barber's viewing from the Mahal Funeral Home happened to be on Father's Day. Mourners lined up for blocks to pay their final respects. Not everyone was able to get through the line that day. A second night of viewing was



considered, but it was decided the strain on the family would be too much. The funeral the following day had a full State Police honor guard and was attended by police department personnel from near and far.

Recent honors in memoriam

In 2017, Officer Barber received a Congressional Commendation with his story entered into the Congressional Record on March 9, 2017 by Congressman Matt Cartwright. That same year he was listed on the Officer Down Memorial page funded by

the U.S. Department of Justice.



Additionally in 2017, his name was engraved upon the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C. and then read at the candlelight vigil attended by 30,000 supporters, including dignitaries such as Attorney General Jeff Sessions and White House Chief of Staff John Kelly.

Officer Barber's family was also invited to the National Peace Officer Memorial Day event on the

South Lawn of the Capitol to hear President Donald Trump speak that same week.

In 2018 Officer Barber had his story and profile appear at the newly opened National Law Enforcement Museum's Hall of Remembrance in Washington, D.C. There, one can see his photo and read the events that transpired on the day of his death through an interactive kiosk.

In May 2019, during National Police Week, Milan Barber will be enshrined into the American Police Hall of Fame in Titusville, Florida. His name and police department will be engraved upon the Memorial Wall within the museum.

In the long history of the Borough of Minersville, Officer Milan Barber was the only policeman to die in the line of duty. In addition to his wife, he left behind daughters Sandy, Gail, and Lynn and a son, Tom, ranging in ages from 23 to 11.

Non-resident season passes will be: \$70 for a Student, \$85 for an Adult, \$65 for a Senior Citizen, and \$130 for a Family up to five plus \$30 for each additional.

A "Family" consists of parents or a couple and up to three children, all permanent residents of the same household and same immediate family ... or one adult and up to four children. A separate pass is required for any adult, 18 or older, residing in the household (adult children, grandparents, aunts, uncles).

Daily admission prices this year remain: \$2 for a Pre-School child and Senior Citizens, \$3 for Student (age four through 17), \$5 for Adult (age 18 and over); Evening admission from 5 to 7 p.m. will be 50% off the daily rate.

Pre-School is a child, age three or younger. Senior Citizens must be age 55 or older.

Children under age 10 must be accompanied by a responsible adult 18 years of age or older. Without a responsible adult, children under 10 will be denied admission to the pool. There is no non-swimmer discount; all patrons entering the pool are required to pay the appropriate fee.

Improvement Projects Galore Raise Quality of Life

Spring has Sprung! I feel confident to join each and every Minersville resident to say I'm looking forward to enjoying the warmer weather and out-

door activities with family and friends.

I'm excited to report TWO of our grant-related projects are set to begin mid-to-late May. Additional projects will start

later.

• 4th Street Playground Update and Renovation – Low bidder for the project, Womer Landscaping, was awarded this project at the April Borough Council meeting. Two sets of equipment – 2-to-

5 age group and 5-to-12 age group – will be installed. Funds for the project come from the \$90,000 joint Borough/Little League grant that was awarded in September 2018. In addition, some old equipment will be removed, new mulch will be spread, and swings (including one for the handicapped) will be installed. As part of an Eagle Scout project, Michael Rizzardi will assist in the instal-

lation of three exercise stations in memory of his late grandfather, Robert Rizzardi.

 Construction of a Memorial Park on the site of the former American Legion is scheduled to begin late May or early June. The low bidder for the project, Performance Construction Services, Inc., was awarded the project at the April Borough Council meeting.

The park is being constructed to honor all deceased and living veterans from our hometown and local surrounding area. A groundbreaking ceremony was planned for Thurs., May 2 at 9:30 a.m.

- The Green Light Go grant-funded projects are scheduled to begin late July or August. The two projects will focus on pedestrian improvements, an over speed warning system, and traffic signal coordination at the eight intersections along the Sunbury Street corridor. ALLELUIA!
- The planned TIP (PennDOT's Transportation Improvement Program) project to mill and pave the entire length of Sunbury Street and replace all handicapped curbs on that corridor has been changed from this year to the summer of 2020.

Police Warning - Beware of Grandparent Scam

The Minersville Police Department advises that the Grandparent Scam is making the rounds again. Beware the urgent phone call from someone claiming to be a family member. Here's how the Grandparent Scam typically plays out.

You get a call from someone pretending to be your grandchild. The person explains that he/she is



in trouble with a story that goes something like this: "There's been an accident and I'm in jail, in the hospital, stuck in a foreign country, and I need your help."

The caller adds enough details about how, what or where the emer-

gency happened to make the story seem plausible. And the distraught caller, you think to yourself, does sort of sound like your grandson or granddaughter.

Often the caller tells you that a third person, such as a lawyer, doctor or police officer, will "explain everything to you" if you call him or her.

"This makes it seem more real when you call and talk to the authority," says attorney Kati Daffan, assistant director of the Division of Marketing Practices at the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). Then the

caller asks you to send or wire money immediately, adding the kicker, "Please, don't tell Mom and Dad!"

Alert -

This financial ruse has been making the

rounds in various incarnations for years. In 2017 nearly one in five people reported losing money in an impostor scheme like the grandparent scam, amounting to a loss of \$328 million, according to the FTC. Those, ages 70 and older, have suffered the highest average losses.

"The scammers are very good at what they do. They make the story very convincing and urgent, so that you wouldn't want to make a mistake," Daffan says. "The stakes are incredibly high, and they're good at pulling at your emotions. They know how to get your fight-or-flight response activated so that your critical thinking faculties are just not the way they are normally."

How do the scammers choose their targets?

Sometimes it's random, but often it's not. "They can buy lead lists of people who've been scammed before, people who are older or people they can get lots of personal information about," Daffan says.

Sometimes the information is gleaned from social networking sites like Facebook, Twitter or Instagram, or by hacking into your email account (your contact list may include the names of relatives).

What if this happens to you?

First, hit the pause button on your natural inclination to panic.

"What people need to do is slow down" and think of what they need to do to determine if the situation is for real, Daffan explains. "Verify the person's identity by asking questions someone else couldn't possibly answer," such as the name and species of your grandchild's first pet. Also, get off the phone and check with a family member or the person who supposedly called you. Your grandchild may just answer her phone from the privacy of home or a dorm.

"The other thing that's a dead giveaway is how they want you to get the money to them," Daffan says. Usually, it's through a wire transfer service (such as Western Union or MoneyGram), an overnight delivery service or courier (with a check or cash), or a prepaid card or gift card, in which case the scammer will ask you to read the numbers on the back of the card over the phone.

"That's just like turning over cash to somebody," Daffan warns. Don't do it! Remember, "Court systems and hospitals don't accept gift cards as payment," Daffan adds.

The Minersville Police Department advises, "Please, call the police immediately after you receive the call."

Use Your Head – Wear a Bicycle Helmet

It's the Law for Under 12; But Safer for All Ages

Helmet use is essential for safe biking. Many riders think bike helmets are meant for children, but the statistics prove otherwise. In fact, a 2008 study by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says head injuries represent about 70 percent of bicycling fatalities.

A good helmet is necessary for all ages and does save lives. Here is some information about bicycle helmet regulations in Pennsylvania and how to get the most out of your chosen helmet.

• Is it illegal to ride a bike without a helmet in Pennsylvania?

It is not required by law for a bicycle rider to wear a helmet in Pennsylvania unless the rider is a child. Section 3510 of Pennsylvania Bicycle Law states "a person under 12 years of age shall not operate a pedal-cycle or ride as a passenger on a pedal-cycle unless the person is wearing a pedal-cycle helmet..."

The provisions of the Bicycle Law also require that helmets be worn by those restrained in a seat attached to a bicycle, as well as those seated in a trailer being towed by a bicycle.

• When can you stop wearing a bike helmet?

Even though state law does not require an adult bicyclist to wear a helmet, the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation advises that bicyclists of every age wear a helmet. Helmets that have been certified by the American Standards Institute, the American Society for Testing and Materials, the Snell Memorial Foundation, or the Consumer Product Safety Commission give assurance of protection.

Tips for helmet use - check the fit!


- 1. The front edge should be no more than 1 inch above your eyebrows. With the straps fastened, push up firmly on the front edge of the helmet. If it moves back, the straps are too loose.
- 2. Push the helmet side-to-side and front-to-back. It should be snug enough that the motion wrinkles the skin at your temples.
- 3. A ponytail can alter your fit, so make sure to test a helmet wearing the same hairstyle you ride with.
- 4. To test that a buckled chinstrap is tight enough,

open your mouth halfway; the helmet should press down on the top of your head as you do.

- 5. The front and back straps should make a V that meets just below and forward of the ear.
- 6. Grab the back tip and try to pull it up over the top of your head to the front. If the front of your helmet slips down, shorten the back straps.

The majority of bicycle fatalities involved riders who were not wearing helmets.

The group will then travel downhill from there (rocky in places), ending in Forrestville and crossing the creek five times. Meet across the street from the Forrestville Fire Company. (7.5 miles moderate)

It only takes a bottle cap full of water to breed mosquitoes. Turn over



buckets, barrels, keep tarps dry, cover tires, and flush bird bath water. It can take as little as 7 days for an egg to become an adult mosquito.

The ordinance also requires the person walking the dog to clean up any fecal matter discharged by the dog. Fecal matter deposited by the animal on the owner's property must be picked up within twenty-four hours to prevent becoming a danger

to public health.
All dogs are required to be licensed and vaccinated. Dogs are prohibited in the Recreation Complex on South 4th Street.

High grass and weeds

Borough Ordinance 291 requires grass and weeds not exceed eight inches in height. Not only is it unsightly, the wild growth can become home to rodents, snakes and other creatures we don't want in our yards or near our homes.

Be a good neighbor and keep your grass cut and your property free of junk and debris. Violators are subject to a \$300 fine or risk a lien placed on the property if the Borough has to cut the grass in the interest of public safety.

compost site. The system monitors illegal dumping from any vehicle entering and leaving. Only recyclable materials and grass and brush clippings are permitted. Fines for violators could run into thousands of dollars.

Landlords must register

The Residential Rental Ordinance requires landlords to register their properties with the Borough. It also regulates inspection of the unit, which is conducted every three years, and inspection of all rental units prior to any change of occupancy.

The ordinance also contains regulations for Occupant Permits for all tenants. This is a one-time fee for each occupant in a rental property as long as the tenant resides in the same unit. Failure for either the landlord or occupants to abide by this ordinance will result in citations issued by the Borough.

All forms for registrations are available at the

Borough Office. Contact the office with any questions regarding this ordinance.

Speed limit enforcement

The speed limit in the Borough is 25 miles per hour. The Minersville Police Department utilizes an ENRADD system to monitor motorists' speeds. Do not exceed the speed limit. Speeding may result in a large fine, points on your driver's license, and high-

er insurance premiums. It also creates risks for pedestrians and other motorists. Slow down. Save a life.

Bill payments

Minersville Borough, Water, and Sewer departments have added two other options for bill payment – online payment and direct withdrawal.

Please understand, these are optional ways to pay. You may continue to pay by cash, check or money order payments at our office Monday through Thursday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Friday 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.; or mail payments to our office at 2 E. Sunbury Street, Minersville.

You will now be able to pay online by credit/debit card or by e-check. There are separate fees associated with this option that would be added to the payment. To make the payments online you will need the account and pin number.

If you have multiple accounts you will have a separate pin number for each account. Should you lose your pin number, contact the Borough office to send a letter to your billing address with the pin number. Pin numbers will not be given out over the phone.

Direct withdrawal payments will be taken from the bank account on the billing due date. Questions regarding the new payment options? Contact the Borough Office at 570-544-2149.

Replacing your windows?

If you are contemplating replacing windows, be aware before purchasing that all windows installed in this area must have a U-factor of 0.30 or lower. This number has been established under the Uniform Construction Code and adopted by the State of Pennsylvania and enforced throughout. If the windows do
